COPD is the third-leading cause of death in America; kills 140,000 every year

COPD refers to a group of diseases that cause airflow blockage and breathing-related problems. This includes the diseases emphysema and chronic bronchitis. While tobacco smoke is the primary cause of COPD, one in four people with the disease have never smoked. Secondhand smoke, toxic fumes in the workplace, and even genetics can cause COPD.

Identifying and treating COPD. The initial symptoms include chronic or "smoker's cough," chronic phlegm production, shortness of breath, and wheezing. Early detection and treatment may change its course. A breathing test can measure lung function and detect COPD in those at risk. Treatment requires professional diagnosis, followed by avoiding tobacco smoke, and removing air pollutants from the home and at work. Symptoms may be treated with medication and pulmonary rehabilitation.

"The most important aspect in the treatment for COPD lies in the hands of those suffering, and that's avoiding tobacco smoke and other air pollutants," said Dr. Wesley Williams, medical director at GlobalHealth. "We could reduce COPD by 75% and, in theory, save more than 100,000 lives lost to COPD each year if people would simply quit smoking."

COPD prevention. Approximately 75% of COPD deaths are attributed to cigarette smoking. So, the most important first step is to quit smoking. Also, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends avoiding exposure to air pollutants in the home, which includes secondhand smoke, as well as toxic fumes in the workplace.

Managing COPD. The American Lung Association recommends patients talk to their primary care physician, take their prescribed medications and other treatments to develop a disease management plan. Noting that each person's COPD is different and so is each plan.
